From the Curate

It has almost been a year since I was ordained a deacon and at the end of this month, on the 30th of June, I will be ordained a priest.

What's the difference? I hear you ask.

Well, according to the ordinal, the order of service for ordinations, a deacon is called to proclaim the gospel in word and deed, to serve the community, to seek out the poor and weak, the sick and lonely and those who are oppressed and powerless so that the love of God may be made visible. They are called to share in pastoral ministry, the leading of worship, preaching, praying, accompany those searching, and assist in administering the sacraments.

Whereas a priest is also called to be messengers, watchmen and stewards. They are called to teach and admonish, to feed and provide for the children of God, to hear repentance and to declare God's forgiveness. They are to preside at the Lord's table and to bless the people in God's name.

What does all this mean in practice? Over the last year, I have led on the Advent Star project, brought Communion to those who can't get to church, I have lead, preached and assisted in our regular services, as well as leading on our Ukraine memorial service. I regularly visit our nursing homes and we either have a service of singing hymns, which is great fun, or a service of Holy Communion. I have taken funerals and walked alongside those who grieve. I have been involved in welcoming children who come on school visits and I regularly support Octotots. I have been a part of our community activities, supporting Love Lillington and sitting on the Community Action Forum. As well as all this and many more activities, I attend regular training provided by the diocese and work towards a portfolio of work to complete my curacy.

And I have loved every minute of it! I will always be a deacon serving this community and others I am called to but I am looking forward to what the next year brings as a priest. I hope to enable encounters of reconciliation with God through celebrating Holy Communion and sharing God's love and forgiveness with all.

Welcome to St Mary Magdalene's Open Gardens

Here is your guide to a selection of lovely Lillington gardens you can visit on Saturday 22nd June, 2pm – 4.30pm

110 Valley Road CV32 7SD (Jenice Stalker)

An exceptionally lively rose garden filled with standards, bushes and more. Expect to see stunning jasmine, peonies, wildflowers and perennials. Refreshments including cake will be served. Excellent wheelchair access.

30 Cromer Road CV32 7RZ (Snatts)

A large, interesting garden with ponds and a varied and unusual collection of trees. Optional rabbit petting(!), refreshments including cakes and a Plant Sale. Good wheelchair access.

7 Chestnut Gardens CV32 7UW (Mark and Sally Bullock)

Small but perfectly formed, this is a garden filled with interest and a multi-layered approach to planting. Expect natural wooden sculptures, unusual plants and plenty of wildlife. Limited access due to slate path.

11 Cloister Way CV32 6QE (Jackie Frampton)

A mature garden covering one third of an acre. Stunning borders, large lawn and some lovely sculptural topiary; a garden to interest and delight all visitors.

12 Garway Close, CV32 6LH (Len Dixon)

An easy access garden planted with dwarf fruit trees, forming a patio orchard, as well as acers. Lawn with mature borders plus flowering annuals.

The Vicarage, Vicarage Road CV32 7RH (William and Tricia Smith)

A pleasant, large garden with plenty of space to play in! Pond, mature borders and one of the largest lime trees in Lillington. Refreshments. Good access.

13 Vicarage Road CV32 7RH (Annabelle and Matt Paterson)

A mature and pretty walled garden right across the road from the church. Honeysuckles, clematis and a good selection of David Austin roses, as well as many interesting trees. Access – there is one step.

17 Lime Avenue CV32 7DE (Carol and Robin Innes)

A large mature garden with pretty borders and trees including a multi-stemmed silver birch. Patio and pergola with pretty climbing plants. Cream teas being served. Access – there is one step.

He had managed to beg & borrow a few items but could not afford an oven. Within a week of referral to Love Lillington, this chap was not only provided with a brand new, fully installed oven but also a vacuum, bedding and other household items.

The difference this has made should not be under estimated. He is cooking meals again and is able to keep his new home clean. He feels valued & supported, there is a visible difference in his demeanour.

From the point of view of the referrer, I'd like to say how efficient the whole process was & how sensitively the support was given.

On behalf of this resident, I would like to say a very big thank you to everyone involved in Love Lillington, you have helped him 'feel normal' and you make a positive difference to your community.

Mike Hyslop – A tribute from Jeff Burgess

Mike Hyslop died in The Albemarle Rest Home on 23rd April. He was a great supporter of St Mary Magdalene Church serving in many capacities including Gift Aid Secretary, member of the Banking Rota and CARE Committee and Lesson Reader. For many years he was treasurer of Abbeyfields Care Home and, although this was a volunteer role, it did involve dealing with all the finances including the paying of staff. He and Ann came to live in Leamington on his retirement in 1992.

Ann was born and brought up in this vicinity, whereas Mike was from Wolverhampton. So how did they meet? It was probably all down to Mike's poor dancing skills. He, his brother and friends were holidaying in an Hotel in Torquay at the same time as Ann and her friend. Dancing was the evening entertainment and Mike was dumped by his partner on account of his two left feet. Casting round for a new partner, Mike's eyes alighted on Ann. She, too, had to watch her toes!

Tennis was a shared interest and Ann was impressed when Mike told her that he was chairman of his local tennis club. The fact that he drove an Alvis car did not go unnoticed. An invitation to stay with Mike and his parents followed and the rest, as they say, is history.

Mike volunteered to serve an extra year in the RAF after his two year's National Service, so that he could continue studying for his accountancy qualification. He rose to the rank of corporal. He was a successful sprinter and mile runner and also enjoyed a game of football. At the time he met Ann, he worked for Boulton and Paul, the aircraft makers. They were married in 1964 and lived in a village outside Wolverhampton. Mike qualified as an accountant and, when his company was taken over by the Dowty Group, they moved to Cheltenham. Mike's work took him on business trips to Europe and The USA but financial trouble was brewing at a subsidiary in Canada. It took three years to get that company back on an even financial keel and it was whilst they were living outside Toronto that the first of their three daughters (Fiona) was born. Back in the UK, they lived initially in Cheltenham (where Helen and Anna were born) and then Worcester followed by Beaconsfield.

Mike was interviewed for Crosstalk by Roderick Clark in 2011 and, speaking of his life, he said:

"Everything was based on Christ and Christianity from my point of view. I had a reasonably successful career but I had to deal with some horrible business situations and I brought my faith into it. Once I was told to produce a whole set of accounts over the weekend ready for Monday. I tried to play with a straight bat, to be reasonable, however others were behaving. I would not be part of any dirty tricks"



Mike's faith was an "anchor" as they moved around and so was Ann as she set up a succession of homes and managed the children.

Mike and Ann might have chosen to live near one of their daughters in retirement, but Ann's parents were needing a bit of support, so Leamington was chosen. Their life in Almond Avenue has provided a well earned period of calm after such a busy career. Mike was able to indulge his passion for model engineering and the 174 feet gauge 1 railway track in the garden was testament to that. The steam locomotive which puffed its way around that track was built from scratch by Mike.

Ruth and I enjoyed several holidays with Mike and Ann and found them such good fun to be with. Rest in peace, Mike and may God bless Ann, Fiona, Helen, Anna and seven grandchildren as they mourn.

The funeral was in the church on Monday 20 May.

Green Tip!

Sustainable fashion. How can we use our influence as consumers to encourage more sustainable manufacturing of clothing? Time is precious and we need quick and easy ways to shop responsibly. Here are two suggestions: -

Buy fairly traded clothes if you can. Do a search on the internet for sustainable fashion and also check out the Fairtrade website where you can find a short list of clothing producers in their section on "cotton".

However, these specialist sustainable brands tend not to offer the wide selection of clothing items that we need. So consider writing to your favourite retailers to ask them to reduce the impact of their business and sourcing of materials on the planet. A great site for this is **directory.goodonyou.eco**. Good On You rates both retailers and clothing producers for their impact on planet, people and animals. Most companies fall within the bottom three ratings of "we avoid", "not good enough" and "it's a start". Far fewer companies fall in the top two categories of "good" and "great". If you need to buy clothers from retailers or brands in the lower categories then drop the company an email stating that you would like to see the company perform better in Good On You's ratings so that you are happier to buy from them in the future. You will need to find the contact email address or online contact form from the clothing retaillers website. Once you have done that it is quick and easy to send a short message. And then expect a positive and serious reply!

Saturday Coffee Mornings Recipes

Apricot & Walnut Bread

This dense bread is fantastic eaten as hot buttered toast. It's a brilliant after-school teatime snack that keeps children going until supper. Best to make two loaves and freeze one for another day.

Makes 2 loaves (you will need an electric mixer with a large bowl for this)

Ingredients

250g dried apricots roughly chopped
1 earl grey tea bag (or any tea bag!)
75g oats plus 2 tbsp extra for sprinkling
2 eggs lightly beaten
150g golden caster sugar
500g self-raising flour
1 tsp salt
1 tbsp baking powder
100ml milk
100g walnut pieces

Method

- 1. Put the dried apricots and the tea bag in a small pan with 450ml water and bring to the boil. Simmer very gently for 5 minutes then turn off the heat and remove the tea bag. Stir in the 75g oats before covering with a lid. Allow to cool.
 - 2. Preheat the oven to 170C/325F/Gas 3, and line 2 x 900g loaf tins with greaseproof paper.



3. In the bowl of an electric mixer, beat together the eggs and sugar. Sieve the flour, salt and baking powder together before adding to the egg mixture with the motor running on its lowest setting. Add the cooled apricot mixture and the milk and continue to mix until completely combined.

- 4. Turn the motor off before adding the walnuts. Fold these in with a metal spoon so as not to break them up too much.
- 5. Spoon into the lined loaf tins, sprinkle with the remaining oats (I personally found a tbsp extra per loaf for sprinkling a bit much so just put a dessert spoon on). Bake for 1-1 ¼ hours. The bread will be cooked when the surface is cracked and a skewer inserted in the loaf comes out clean.

NB: My electric mixer bowl is not big enough to complete the mixing when making two loaves. I transfer the mixture to a large mixing bowl for the final stages.
